

NFBC Member Profiles: Barb and Larry Reade

If you're new to the NFBC, or new to cycling in Western New York, you might not know that the friendly folks you're chatting with on a club ride, Barb and Larry Reade, are legendary cyclists and leaders in the Buffalo cycling community. They have been highly successful racing competitors, but also extremely generous in contributing their time to our club and other cycling organizations, promoting our sport.

While both Barb and Larry have spent a great deal of time focused on cycling competition, their love of cycling, and the social aspects of NFBC's touring style of club riding have made them long-time members of the NFBC. For Larry, "I enjoy riding, so why not be out there with you all? New places, new faces, that keeps it all enjoyable". NFBC rides

might not have contributed to their racing acumen, but racing certainly made them great NFBC riders. Barb said "racing helped immensely when I started club rides. Racing involves much more than just going fast. Racers develop quick responses and the good riding habits that are essential for riding in groups."

Barb and Larry both have very long and accomplished racing careers, and while Barb has retired from that

aspect of cycling, Larry continues to compete. Larry won the first USCF 25-mile time trial for masters in 1975, and he managed to repeat that every other year until 1984! Barb mentions that "Larry has a total of 13 National Championship iersevs and several from the World Masters Games in Portland, OR in 1998. He also held several national time trial time records, but a distance change (from 25 mi. to 40 km.) and technological advances have changed all that." For Larry, the most memorable wins were America's Cup races in 1980 and 1981 where he "managed to break away and solo to the finish" in Sutton, Quebec. Then there is the gold at track nationals in 1990, the perimeter record for Cayuga Lake, the gold at the 2003 cycling masters' national championships... The list really does go on and on, and it keeps getting longer! Barb has never been fond of the training aspect of racing, but the competitive edge takes over during the race. She too has a long list of racing accomplishments, the most recent being a 3rd place in the 2007 Florida Senior Games State Championships.

Larry started keeping a log of his mileage in August of 1960, when he bought a track bike from the Heil Brothers shop on Broadway. It was so much lighter than his 1950 J.C.Higgins that he was inspired to ride more. Bicycling to work at the Ford Plant, a practice he continued for 30 years, launched him toward his current total of 360,000 miles. Barb got her first bicycle as a gift from Larry, who threatened to ride it himself if she didn't get some good use from it!

They were both interested in racing, but "not much was happening around here in the '60s, so we started going to races in Canada and Great Eastern Rallies (annual League of American Wheelmen events)" said Larry. That wasn't enough, so, working together, they began organizing and pro-

moting races here at home. When the Eastern Hills Mall was being built, they recognized that the perimeter road would be perfect for criteriums. Larry said, "in 1972 I rounded up some officials and started the annual Eastern Hills Mall Championship." They learned how to promote a race by doing it, fielding phone calls, begging prizes from local merchants, and mailing out hundreds of flyers.



That race was a huge success, and launched them on a path that continues to this day. "When stores at the mall started opening on Sundays, we moved to Putnam Way at SUNY Buffalo with the first Earth Day Criterium in 1980, which became the UB Classic until 1992" said Larry. According to Barb "we spent 25 years promoting USCF races (at least 2 a year and sometimes more!) while holding down jobs and raising four kids! Until recently, we were still active with the BBC, and of course Larry has a soft spot for the Empire State Games. Most racers have no idea how much work is involved." Most recently, Larry served as Venue Coordinator for the cycling events in the Empire State Summer Games in Buffalo (July 22-25). And, as always, Larry says "Barbara has always done all the backup work for this, and I'm glad she's still putting up with me!"

Larry and Barb's 4 children share the family racing spirit as adults. If all the cycling activity weren't enough, they also have non-cycling interests/ hobbies, and at 77 (Larry) and 73 (Barb), continue to enjoy riding, organizing, and competing!


